From the LONDON GAZETTE. Admiralty-Office, July 30.

Y Letters from Capt. Douglas of his Ma-By Letters from Capt. Douglas of his war and 27th of last Month, it appears, that immediately after raifing the Siege of Quebec, of which he gave an Account in his Letters of the 8th and 15th of May, every proper Measure was taken to facilitate the farther Operations against the Rebels, by fending down the River all the Pilots which could be procured to bring up the Transports that were daily expected with Gen. Burgoyne from England and Ireland; and, that no Time might be loft on their Arrival, he had provided Pilots for the upper River, and placed Frigates and armed Veffels in proper Stations to affift and efcort them; and alf, left the Transports should be prevented by contrary Wind from failing up the River, he had flationed Veil's with Provisions at proper Places for the Use of the Troops, if they should be obliged to difembark and march by Land. By thefe Dispositions, all the Transports with Troops, which had Pilots on board, proceeded up the River wirhout flopping at Quebec, and arrived at Three Rivers Time enough to defeat the Rebels, and afterwards drive them from St. John's, and all their Posts below Lake Champlain. Captain Douglas in the fame Letter fays, that the prudent and spirited Behaviour of Captain Harvey, of the Martin Sloop, cannot be too much commended; and that the Zeat, Vigour, and Unanimity of his Majesty's Servants on both Elements was fcarcely equalled on any other Occasion within his Remembrance. He also writes that he was, in Concert with General Carleton, confidering upon a proper Esta-blishment for armed Vessels to be employed on the Lakes Champlain and Ontario, and in contriving the most expeditious Means of getting them, with other Craft, on the faid Lakes, in order to the better accelerating the Passage of the Army; and that Captain Harvey, of the Martin, was returning to Sorel in order to exa-mine into the Means of floating between Camels (as is practifed in Russia and Holland) through the Rapids of Chamble into Lake Champlain, the fix armed Veffels, one of which was already arrived from England, and the others hourly expected.

Admiralty-Ofice, July 30. Captain Le Cras, Senior Captain of his Majesty's Ships at Plymouth, in his Letter, dated the 26th Inflant, has the following Paragraph, viz. "The Mercury Brig, a Prize to the Cerberus and Merlin, arrived the Night before; and the Person who had the Command of the faid Brig fays, they parted from the Cerberus the 26th of June, Block Island on the Coast of America, bearing N.N.E. Distance 17 Leagues ; and that they then faw Vice Admiral Shuldham with his Squadron, and the Transports under his Convoy, fleering W. by S. for New-York; and that on the Evening before they had feen the Greyhound Frigate, with Gene-

ral Howe on board."

Admiralty-Office, July 30. By a Letter re-ceived from Vive Admiral Young, dated at Antigua the 31st of May last, it appears, that Captain Bryne, of his Majesty's Ship the Hind, which had been fent on Service to St. Augustine in the Province of Georgia, having Intelligence that the Rebels were fitting armed Vessels in the adjacent Rivers; and being at Anchor off Sunbury River, he ordered Lieu tenant Ellis of the Hinchinbrooke armed Schooner, with the Ship's Tender and Boats, manned and armed to proceed over the Bar, where they fet on Fire a Brig that was loading, and a Ship on the Stocks, intended by the Rebels for a Privateer to carry 20 Guns. It further appears from the Admiral's aforementioned Letter, that fince the Account transmitted in his Letter of the 3d of March, and published in the Gazette the 8th of last Month, the Cruifers under his Command had feized 17 more Ships and Vessels, either belonging to or employed in carrying on a Trade with his Majesty's rebellious Subjects in North

The French bore down upon her, and the Admiral hailed the Enterprize, and ordered the Captain to come on board immediately; to which he replied, that if the Admiral had any Thing to communicate to him, he might come on board the Enterprize, as he should not go out of his Ship. The Duke infifted that he should, or he would fink him; and the French Ships accordingly pointed their Guns at the Enterprize; but Sir Thomas Rich, regardless of their hostile Threats and Preparations, declared that he never received any Orders but from his own Admiral, and that they were at Liberty to fire whenever they pleafed, as he positively would not go on board; upon which the Duke of Chartres admired his spirited Conduct, and begged it as a Favour that he would do him the Honour of coming on board, as he wished much to be better acquainted with him; Sir Thomas Rich immediately went, and was received with the atmost Respect by all the Officers,

Whereas, on the contrary, if they were incorrigible, they would be worked without Remission to the atmost of their Ability; the Term of their Servitude would be doubled upon the fift Attempt to efcape, and upon the fecond they would be liable to tuffer Death without Benefit of Ciergy.

Under these circumstances, therefore, directions are privately iffued to their adherents in fuch of the British ports as are most conveniently fituated, to fit out large fhips with the commodities particularly wanted. This is accordingly done, and the veffels fail to a given latitude under the plaufible pretext of bearing to some well-affected part of America. When they arrive at the given latitude, however, provincial privateers are in readiness to seize them, and they strike without a blow, well knowing that their owners are to be amply indemnified for the utmost loss which they may seemingly fustain, in this imaginary capture.

It is confidently faid that the owners of a rich ship lately taken by the Provincials near the Gulph of Florida, have discovered that the mather perfidiously becrayed her into the hands of the enemy, and are taking proper steps to procure fatisfaction for the injury they have fustained.

The matters of most of the vessels from Jamaica which were lately taken by the American privateers, without firing a gun, have fince their arrival in London applied to the owners for appointments as commanders of other ships, but all of them have been refused except two, whose conduct was impeachable, from their not being in a fituation to defend themselves.

A letter from Capt. NE of the wifest and greatest Men that England ever produced was inclined to introduce Dancing as an important Article into the Academic System of Education. I mean Lord Clarendon, who was as ferfible of its Advantages, as Monf. Fuillet himself.

It is, however, univerfally allowed, that there are Periods of Life which should naturally renounce the Pleafures of the Dance. What a ridiculous Extravagance would it appear in a grey-haired Alderman, should he describe a Minuet, or supply in a Cotilion the Place of a polished active Youth! The numberless Distortions, which are sometimes forced into a wrinkled Face by the Louvre, seldom raise any Degree of Satisfaction in the Spectator, oftener Campassion, always an Inclination to Laughter. The Amusement of Dancing, as the Dalliance of Love, is equally denied the Gravity of advanced Years. A Love Song is as much expected as a Jig, from a Man of eighty. Infirmity sets each Performance in a ridiculous Light. Who could endure Spectacles at a Dance, especially if Blindness proceeds from Age, when to trace the Figure of the Dance requires the same irksome Pains and poring Distress with the small Character of a Persian Manuscript?

The Quality too of the Dancer is of prime Importance. From a Want of due Attention to this, many hideous Misailiances are often fafhioned, Digniy become fronckfome, and Office is disfigured by an unsuitable Gaiety. Let us, therefore, suppose an Instance, where the Station of the Dancer is strongly contrasted with the Amesement itself. Where a Lord Chief Justice, with the most finished Graces of Person, to measure a Cotillon at Madam Cornelys's, who would not feel for the Dancer? Who could separate the Idea of Magistracy from his prefent Situation? Let us now drop Supposition, and give an Example of this strange Contrast from an Order of Men, whose Duties are the most abhorrent from the Pleasures of a Dance.

Correspondent, dated Albany, Oct. 17. You doubliefs have heard of our Engagement between our Fleet on the Lake, and the Enemy, on the 11th instant. Our advice left them the 12th, our fleet then at anchor near Schuyler's island, in a shattered and leaky condition; the enemy just appearing in fight, with a light foutherly breeze. Even's fince have been very unfavourable: Our fleet made but very little tarry at ancher, only to stop their leaks, &c. and proceeded with all the dispatch their condition would admit of, towards Crown-Point. A favourable northerly gale affifted the enemy to run up with the fleet, when a fecond engagement commenced, which lasted five glaffes, most of the time in musket shot, very warm and sharp, in which our men conducted with inimitable spirit and bravery, but were obliged to submit to superior strength. In this affair our fleet is almost totally ruined; only one galley escaped, with sloop Enterprize, and two small schooners, and one gondola—the rest all taken, burnt and defiroyed. General Arnold fought as long as possible in the galley Congress, when he was obliged to run her ashore, burn her, and escape by land to Ticonderega, having los 20 of his men. General Waterbury, in the Walhington galley, fought till he was fo shattered,

LONDON, August 26.

Extract of a letter from Portsmouth, August 28. "On Monday evening a melancholy accident happened to the long-boat belonging to the Richmond frigate, now at Spithead: The gunner, boatswain, three midshipmen, and carpenter, with feveral feamen, had been to the dock, and loaded the boat with stores for the use of the ship. On their return to the ship, opposite the hospital, a little way out of the harbour, the boat funk, and the following perfons were drowned, viz. the gunner, boatfwain, three midshipmen, and three seamen. The carpenter saved himself by swimming. This accident happened, it is supposed, by overloading the boat. The eight dead bodies now lie on the shore."
