 Journal of the Proceedings
 OF THE
 CONTINENTAL CONGRESS,
 Held at PHILADELPHIA, May 10, 1775.

IN PROVINCIAL CONGRESS,
 New-York, Dec. 23, 1775.

WHEREAS, on the 13th inst. on informa-
 tion, that a number of disaffected persons
 in Queen's county, had been supplied with arms and
 ammunition, from on board the *Asia* ship of war,
 and had been arraying themselves in military man-
 ner, to oppose the measures taking by the United
 Colonies for the defence of their just rights and pri-
 vileges, and thrown out many threatening expressions
 against sundry persons residing in that and the neigh-
 bouring Counties: It was resolved by this Congress
 as their opinion, that such conduct is inimical to the
 common cause of the United Colonies, and ought
 not by any means to be suffered; but that measures
 should be immediately taken, to put a stop to it: And
 it was therefore ordered, That the inhabitants of the
 said County should appear by a Committee before
 this Congress, on Wednesday next, at ten
 o'clock in the morning, to give satisfaction in the
 premises, with which order the said inhabitants of
 Queen's County have not complied. And whereas
 the persons above mentioned and their adherents,
 have opposed the election of Representatives for that
 County in this Congress, on a poll opened for that
 purpose, whereby that County remains unrepresented
 in this Congress. And whereas, a prevailing party
 prevented the election of Delegates for the County
 of Richmond, at a late poll there opened for that
 purpose; by means whereof the said County is not
 represented in this Congress. And whereas, the
 poll list for Queen's County has been returned to this
 Congress, whereby the persons opposing such repre-
 sentation as aforesaid, and appearing to this Con-
 gress, to be inimical to the interest of the United
 Colonies, may be ascertained.

Resolved First, That such inimical persons as a-
 foresaid, have been guilty of a breach of the gen-
 eral Association, and of an open contempt of the au-
 thority of this Congress, as effectually representing
 the majority of the inhabitants of this Colony.

Resolved Secondly, That the inhabitants of the
 County of Richmond, by neglecting to elect Repre-
 sentatives in this Congress, have been guilty of a
 breach of the general Association.

Resolved Thirdly, That the Committee of the said
 County of Richmond, do and shall, within fifteen
 days after the publication hereof, return to this
 Congress or the Committee of Safety, a list of the
 names of those who oppose a representation of the
 said county, in this Congress, to the end, that the
 delinquents against the common cause in that county
 may be ascertained, and that in default thereof, the
 whole County of Richmond be deemed delinquent.

Resolved Fourthly, That the said Delinquents in
 the said Counties respectively, and each and every of
 them, be and hereby are entirely put out of the pro-
 tection of this Congress.

Resolved Fifthly, That all friendly and commercial
 intercourse between the said persons so put respect-
 fully out of the protection of this Congress, and the
 other inhabitants of this Colony, ought to be, and
 the same as far as can be effected by the recommenda-
 tion of this Congress, hereby is and shall continue
 to be totally interdicted, until further orders of this
 Congress, or the Committee of public Safety.

And to the end, That no persons may plead igno-
 rance of the aforesaid Resolves and this Order, It is
 ordered, That the same, together with a list of such
 Delinquents as aforesaid in each of the said Counties
 respectively, be without delay, printed and dispersed
 in hand bills, and inserted in all the News papers of
 this Colony.

Extract of a Letter from Philadelphia.

"If admittance is desirous of stopping the
 effusion of British blood, the opportunity is now

Some dispatches arrived in town early yesterday
 morning from Admiral Mann, commander in chief
 of his Majesty's fleet in the Mediterranean, said to
 contain an account of a fleet of French men of war
 arriving in the Gut of Gibraltar.

All the officers in the army now in America, we
 are informed, have an actual promise of advance-
 ment on their return from thence.

Orders are given for four engineers to embark
 forthwith for Boston.

Orders are sent to the Warren at Woolwich to get
 ready, with all imaginable dispatch, eighty tons of
 grape shot.

The Spaniards work night and day at Ferrol and
 Carthagea, in getting ready a fleet; and at the latter
 place, every thing in the naval department is under
 the direction of Mr. Beal, an English builder.

We are desired to assure the public, that Mr.
 Maskall the apothecary, does not live in the "direct
 road to," but in the direct road FROM Tyburn.

CAMBRIDGE, December 21.

Capt. Martindale, in one of our privateers, was lately
 decoyed near to one of the enemy's ships of war, in the
 Bay, and was unhappily taken and carried into Boston.

Capt. Manley has, within a few days past, taken
 another valuable prize, a sloop from Virginia, bound to
 Boston, loaded with corn and oats; fitted out and sent by
 Lord Dunmore.

Last Friday night seven American masters of vessels,
 who had, at different times, been taken by the enemy
 and carried into Boston, made their escape from that
 place. From one of them we have obtained the following
 intelligence, viz. That all the drugs and medicines in
 the town, have been seized for the use of the army.

That on the 14th instant, General Howe issued orders
 for taking down the old North meeting-house, and 100
 old wooden dwelling-houses and other buildings, to make
 use of for fuel.---That vessels are fitting out for the
 West-Indies, in order to get supplies for the garrison:---
 That Capt. Martindale, mentioned above, with his officers
 and men, were sent to England:---That one Morrison,
 who officiates as a Presbyterian minister, being appointed
 searcher of those people who were permitted to leave
 the town, promised on receiving a bribe, to let a person
 bring out 240l. sterling, in cash and plate; but afterwards
 basely deceived him of the whole of it.

The recruiting parties out of each regiment are gone
 to England:---That two regiments and a number of
 light-horse, under convoy of a frigate, were embarked
 for Halifax:---And that there were not in the town,
 provisions sufficient to supply the navy and army for a
 longer time than six weeks.

It was yesterday reported, that the above two regiments,
 &c. were failed for Rhode-Island.

PROVIDENCE, December 15.

Yesterday Mr. Philip Palmer arrived here from
 Quebec by way of Lake Champlain. He was taken
 in a fishing vessel the 5th of October last, by the
 ship General Gage, on her passage from Boston to
 Quebec, which place he left the 21st of September,
 and was at Col. Arnold's head quarters, seven
 leagues from the city, on the 23d. The Colonel
 with his detachment had been within musket shot of
 the walls, taken four prisoners, and killed two men
 in a barge belonging to the Lizard frigate: He was
 fired on from the walls, and had two men wounded,
 one of whom is since dead. He was waiting to be
 reinforced by General Montgomery, and expected
 soon to be in possession of the place.---Thirteen fail
 of vessels from Montreal had fallen into the hands of
 General Montgomery, having on board 1500 fugi-

of clothes, 150 chests of arms, 900 barrels of flour, &c. but they had thrown overboard large quantities of powder before they surrendered.—The Gaspee brig and a snow escaped, on board one of which General Carleton got to Quebec disguised, with about 40 regulars.—Before Mr. Palmer left that city, 147 regulars had arrived from Newfoundland, 40 marines had been landed from the Lizard, with her guns, and it was expected Carleton would muster about 500 men to defend the place; but the Canadians in general refused to take up arms.

Any orders relative to the prisoners will be strictly observed, the Committee and Inhabitants of this county being determined to pursue every measure which the Congress may recommend to them, as necessary for the preservation of these colonies, at this time of imminent danger.

Allen Cameron, Dr. John Smith, and John Connelly, being taken into custody, were brought before the Committee, and the following examinations were taken.

Allen Cameron, a native of Scotland, which he left for an affair of honor, and came to Virginia, with an intention to purchase back lands, and intended to go to Henderson for that purpose; but finding it difficult to pass through the back country, encouraged by Lord Dunmore and promise of advancement, he agreed to accept a commission as First Lieutenant in the regiment to be raised by Col. Connelly.

Dr. John Smith, a native of Scotland, left Charles County, Maryland, for political reasons, and intended to go to the Mississippi, but finding it impracticable, he returned to Norfolk, and being induced by Lord Dunmore, with promises of preferment, he accepted the appointment of Surgeon to Col. Connelly's regiment.

John Connelly, a native of Lancaster county, Pennsylvania, admits his letter to Gibson, a copy being shewn him. He went the 25th of July from Fort Dunmore to Lord Dunmore, and delivered him proposals in substance the same with that found in his possession, and in his hand writing. That he was sent by Lord Dunmore to General Gage with letters, and his proposals to Gage; that he left Boston the fourteenth or fifteenth of September, and returned to Lord Dunmore in the middle of October; that he brought intruditions from General Gage to Lord Dunmore, who granted him a commission of Lieutenant Commandant of a regiment to be raised in the back parts and Canada, with powers to nominate officers, who were to be confirmed by Lord Dunmore; that he is now on his way to Detroit, where he was to meet his commission and instructions; that he left Lord Dunmore about ten days ago, who had with him one sloop of sixteen guns, and another of eighteen; that the ship in which Lord Dunmore is on board, is armed with six or eight guns; that a vessel of twenty guns is daily expected from Jamaica; that John Smith never was appointed Surgeon, and that he told Smith if he was the man he represented himself to be, it was possible he would appoint him.

Resolved, That the said Allen Cameron and John Connelly be kept in close and safe custody, until the orders of the Congress be known; and that the Chairman transmit copies of the examinations and papers to the Honorable the President of the Congress, and to the Conventions or Councils of Safety of the colony of Virginia and this province.

Resolved, That Dr. John Smith be kept in custody till the farther orders of this Committee.

“Proposals for raising an army to the Westward, and for effectually obstructing a communication between the Southern and Northern Governments.”

“AS I have, by directions from his Excellency Lord Dunmore, prepared the Ohio Indians to act in concert with me against his Majesty's enemies in that quarter; and have also dispatched intelligence to the different officers of the militia on the frontiers of Augusta county, in Virginia, giving them Lord Dunmore's assurances that such of them as shall hereafter evince their loyalty to his Majesty, by putting themselves under my command, when I should appear amongst them with proper authority for that purpose, of a confirmation of titles to their lands, and the quantity of three hundred acres to all who should take up arms in support of the constitution, when the present rebellion subsided, I will undertake to penetrate through Virginia, and join his Excellency Lord Dunmore at Alexandria early next spring, on the following conditions and authority.

“First, That your Excellency will give me a commission to act as Major Commandant of such troops as I may raise, and embody on the frontiers, with a power to command to the westward and employ such serviceable French and English partizans as I can engage by pecuniary rewards or otherwise.

“Secondly, That your Excellency will give orders to Capt. Lord, at the Illinois, to remove himself, with the garrison under his command, from Fort Gage to Detroit, by the Anabache, bringing with him all the artillery, Stores, &c. &c. to facilitate which undertaking he is to have authority to hire boats, horses, Frenchmen, Indians, &c. &c. to proceed with all possible expedition on that route, as the weather may occasionally permit, and to put himself under my command on his arrival at Detroit.

“Thirdly, That the Commissary at Detroit shall be empowered to furnish such provision as I may judge necessary for the good of the service, and that the commanding officer shall be instructed to give every possible assistance in encouraging the French and Indians of that settlement to join me.

“Fourthly, That an officer of artillery be immediately sent with me to pursue such route as I may find most expedient to gain Detroit, with orders to have such pieces of light ordnance as may be thought requisite for the demolishing of Fort Dunmore and Fort Vincennes, if resistance should be made by the rebels in possession of those garrisons.

“Fifthly, That your Excellency will empower me to make such reasonable presents to the Indian Chiefs, and others, as may urge them to act with vigor in the execution of my orders.

“Sixthly, That your Excellency will send to Lord Dunmore such arms as may be spared, in order to equip such persons as may be willing to serve his Majesty at our junction, in the vicinity of Alexandria, &c. &c. If your Excellency judges it expedient for the good of the service, to furnish me with the authority and other requisites I have mentioned, I shall embrace the earliest opportunity of setting off for Canada, and shall immediately dispatch Lord Dunmore's armed schooner, which now awaits my commands, with an account of what your Excellency has done, and that I shall be ready, if practicable, to join your Lordship by the twentieth of April, at Alexandria, where the troops under my command may fortify themselves under cover of the men of war on that station.

“If, on the contrary, your Excellency should not approve of what I propose, you will be good enough to immediately honor me with your dispatches to the Earl of Dunmore, that I may return as early as possible.”

“Portsmouth, August 9, 1775.

“I HAVE safely arrived here, and am happy to the greatest degree in having so fortunately escaped the narrow inspection of my enemies, the enemies to their country, to good order and government. I should esteem myself defective in point of friendship towards you, should I neglect to caution you to avoid an over zealous exertion of what is now called patriotic spirit; but, on the contrary to deport yourself with that moderation for which you have been always remarkable, and which must, in this instance, tend to your honor and advantage. You may be assured from me, Sir, that nothing but the greatest unanimity now prevails at home, and that the innovating spirit amongst us here is looked upon as ungenerous and undutiful; and that the utmost exertions of the powers of government, if necessary, will be used to convince the infatuated people of their folly. I could, I assure you, Sir, give you such convincing proofs of what I assert, and from which every reasonable person may conclude the effects, that nothing but madness could operate upon a man so far as to overlook his duty to the present constitution, and to form unwarrantable associations with enthusiasts, whose ill timed folly must draw upon them inevitable destruction. His Lordship desires you to present his hand to Captain White Eyes, and to assure him that he is very sorry that he had not the pleasure of seeing him at the treaty, or that the situation of affairs prevented him from coming down.

“Believe me, dear Sir, that I have no motive in writing my sentiments thus to you, farther than to endeavour to free you clear of the misfortunes which, I am confident, mult involve but unhappily too many. I have sent you an address from the people of Great-Britain to the people of America, and I desire you to consider it attentively, which will, I flatter myself, convince you of the idleness of many declamations, and of the absurdity of an intended slavery. Give my love to George, and tell him that he shall hear from me, and I hope to his advantage. Interpret the inclosed speech to Captain White Eyes from his Lordship. Be prevailed upon to shun the popular error and judge for yourself; act as a good subject, and expect the rewards due to your services.

“Brother Captain White Eyes,
“I am glad to hear your good speeches sent me by Major Connelly, and you may be assured I shall put the one end of the belt, which you have sent me, into the hands of our great King, who will be glad to hear from his brothers the Delawares, and will take a strong hold of it. You may rest satisfied, that our foolish young men shall never be permitted to have your lands, but on the contrary, the great King will protect you, and preserve you in the possession of them. Our young people in the country have been very foolish, and done many imprudent things, for which they soon must be sorry, and of which I make no doubt they have acquainted you; but I must desire you not to listen to them, as they would be willing that you should act equally foolish with themselves. But rather let what you hear pass in at one ear and out at the other, so that it may make no impression on your heart until you hear from me fully, which shall be so soon as I can give him farther information, who am your friend and brother.

“Captain White Eyes will please to acquaint the Corn Stalk with these my sentiments also, as well the Chiefs of the Mingoes, and the other Six Nations. Your sincere friend and elder brother,

Extra of a Letter from General Schuyler, dated Albany, December 14, 1775.

“THE Indians delivered us a speech on the 12th, in which they related the substance of all the conferences Colonel Johnson had with them the last summer, concluding with that at Montreal, where he delivered to each of the Canadian Tribes a War Belt and the Hatchet, who accepted it: After which they were invited to FEAST ON A BOSTONIAN AND DRINK HIS BLOOD. An Ox being roasted for the purpose and a pipe of wine given to drink, the War Song was sung.—One of the Chiefs of the Six Nations, that attended at the conference, accepted a very large black War Belt with a Hatchet depicted in it; but would neither eat, nor drink, nor sing the War Song. This famous Belt they have delivered up, and we have now a full proof that the Ministerial servants have attempted to engage the Savages against us.”

The following Letters were brought by an Express which arrived here Yesterday from Virginia.

Extra of a Letter from Northampton County, in Virginia, dated December 17, 1775.

“In my last I gave me much concern to communicate such unwelcome tidings as the defection of Norfolk and Princess Anne Counties, and Lord Dunmore's proclamation respecting the slaves.—It is now with the utmost pleasure I can assure you the scene is totally reversed.—owing (under the blessing of Providence) to the courage and good conduct of our countrymen, of which the Committee have received certain information, and think it matter of sufficient moment to be transmitted by express, as the conveyance is much quicker from this to Philadelphia, than the usual track through the western shore of Virginia.

“Colonel Woodford, with the troops under his command, had been detained some time at the Great-Bridge, the only pass by which he could march to Norfolk, and it was supposed waited for some artillery, to batter a fort which Lord Dunmore had erected there.—Part of the Provincial army had intrenched within gun shot of the fort, to prevent the enemy from strengthening their works, which it seems were not cannon proof, and Lord Dunmore being informed by a deserter (who it is supposed was thrown in his way on purpose) that the detachment near the fort, consisted only of about three hundred men, badly provided with ammunition, sent all his regulars, in the night between the 5th and 6th instant, to the fort, with orders to storm the provincial entrenchments in the

nothing by day break; the regulars accordingly began a most furious attack upon the only part of the breast work which was accessible, but the works were so constructed, that when they attacked this point, they were flanked by part of the provincial lines.—the confusion over which they were obliged to march, admitted only a few men abreast, and those were cut off as fast as they approached.—in a few minutes they were obliged to found a retreat, having lost sixty-two men killed and taken: the prisoners were all wounded, and only ten of them are now alive; amongst them is a Capt. Bottott, Capt. Fordyce, who headed the grenadiers, and a young Capt. Leslie, are among the slain. The provincials did not lose a man.

“After the action, Col. Woodford sent a flag to the fort, proposing that all firing should cease for the day, till the dead were buried; and being desirous to inter Capt. Fordyce (who was a brave officer, and an old acquaintance) with military honours, the proposal was closed with. In the night the enemy evacuated the fort.

“It seems Capt. Leslie, who commands the regulars, did absolutely refuse to act any more on shore, till he could be better supported, as he had already sacrificed many of his men in so desperate a service. This being the case, the Norfolk volunteers and his Lordship's black battalions, refused to act without the assistance of the regulars, the consequence of which has been that his Lordship precipitately carried off his cannon, abandoned the entrenchments at Norfolk, and has taken shelter on board the ships. The provincials, we are told, entered the town on Thursday, without injuring the property of any person; most of the inhabitants had left it before their approach. His Lordship's Squadron, we hear, is now at Sewall's Point, about ten miles below Norfolk: It is said they have plenty of beef and pork, but are badly provided with bread.—The blacks were found rather an incumbrance than a service to his Lordship, destroying one another more than the enemy. Most of those wretched people are now left to shift for themselves.”

Extra of a letter from a Gentleman in Accomack (Virginia) to his friend in Philadelphia, dated December 18.

“Our troops under Col. Woodford, entered Norfolk last Thursday, without the least opposition. Dunmore has drawn his fleet of ships from before the town, and fallen down the river ten miles. Col. Woodford has not lost a man in this expedition, notwithstanding the Governor's troops attempted to force his lines at the Great-Bridge. Every man of sixty grenadiers were either killed, wounded or taken prisoners; indeed all those taken prisoners were wounded, and but ten remained alive when the account came away.—Capt. Fordyce and Capt. Leslie are among the slain.”

Extract of a Letter from Major Spotswood, of Col. Woodford's regiment, to a Friend in this city, dated Great Bridge, December 9.

"We were alarmed this morning by the firing of some guns just after reveille beating, which, as the enemy had paid us this compliment several times, we at first concluded to be nothing but a morning salute; but, in a short time after, I heard Adjutant Blackburn call out, *Boys, stand to your arms.* Col. Woodford and myself immediately got equipped and ran out. The Colonel pressed down to the breast-work, in our front; and my alarm post being 250 yards in another quarter, I ran to it as fast as I could, and by the time I had made all ready for engaging, a very heavy fire ensued at the breast-work, in which were not more than 60 men. It continued for about half an hour, when the King's troops gave way, after sustaining considerable loss, and behaving like true born Englishmen. They marched up to our entrenchments with fixed bayonets; our young troops received them with firmness, and behaved as well as it was possible for soldiers to do. Capt. Leslie, of the regulars, commanded the fort on the other side of the bridge. Capt. Fordyce, of the grenadiers, led the van with his company, and Lieut. Batut commanded the advanced party. The former got killed within a few yards of the breast-work, with 12 privates. The Lieutenant, with 16 soldiers, were taken prisoners, all wounded. Several others were carried into the fort, under cover of their cannon; and, from the blood on the bridge, they must have lost one half of the detachment. It would appear that Providence was on our side; for, during the whole engagement, we lost not a man, and only one was slightly wounded in the hand. Col. Woodford is a brave officer, and a man I love. He had Captain Fordyce buried with the military honours due to his rank, and all the prisoners that fell into our hands, taken the greatest care of. We have not, as yet, been able to ascertain the number killed and wounded on their side. Three officers fuses, with bayonets and cartouch boxes, fell into our hands, from which we judge that there were three commissioned officers killed. As soon as a general return can be made out, it will be sent to the Honourable Convention. I am at present in the greatest hurry, and can only give an account of what I have seen."

Extracts of letters from Col. William Woodford to the Hon. Edmund Pendleton, Esq; President of the General Convention.

"A servant belonging to Major Marshall, who deserted the other night from Col. Scott's party, has completely taken his Lordship in. Lieut. Batut, who is wounded, and at present my prisoner, informs, that this fellow told them that not more than 300 shirtmen were here; and that imprudent man caught at the bait, dispatching Captain Leslie with all the regulars (about 200) who arrived at the bridge about three o'clock in the morning, joined by about 300 black and white slaves, hid planks upon the bridge, and coiled just after our reveille had beat; a lucky time for us, and you'll say rather an improper season for them to make their push, when, of course, all our men must be under arms. The above Lieutenant commanded the advanced party, and Captain Fordyce, of the grenadiers, led the van with his company, who, for his coolness and bravery, deserved a better fate, as well as the brave fellows who fell with him, who behaved like heroes. They marched up to our breast-work with fixed bayonets, and perhaps a hotter fire never happened, or a greater carnage, for the number of troops. None of the blacks, &c. in the rear with Capt. Leslie, advanced farther than the bridge. I have the pleasure to inform you, that the victory was complete, and that most of the dead and wounded, with two pieces of cannon, were carried off under cover of their guns from the fort. We buried 12, besides the Captain (him with all military honours due to his rank) and have prisoners Lieut. Batut and 16 privates, all wounded; 35 stands of arms and accoutrements, 3 officers fuses, powder, ball and cartridges, with sundry other things, have likewise fallen into our hands. This was a second Bunker's-hill affair, in miniature, with this difference, that we kept our post, and had only one man wounded in the hand."

Great Bridge, December 11.

"Since I wrote yesterday, nothing of moment has happened, but the enemy's abandoning the fort. We took possession of it in the morning, and found therein 6 pieces of cannon, which they had spiked up, 7 guns and a bayonet, a few shot, a quantity of spades and shovels, some bedding, 2 barrels of bread, 20 quarters of beef, a box and a half of candles, 4 or 5 iron pots, a few dozen of better, some axes, and old lumber. From the great effusion of blood on the bridge and in the fort, from the accounts of the sentries, who saw many bodies carried out of the fort to be interred, and other circumstances, I conceive their loss to be much greater than I thought it was yesterday, and the victory to be complete.---Lieut. Batut having an inclination to inform the King's troops of the humane treatment he has met with here, I dispatched Ensign Hoomes with a flag of truce, and the Lieutenant's letter, who returned with the following answer from the commander of the fort.---"Capt. Leslie presents his compliments to Mr. Batut, and returns Colonel Woodford his sincere thanks for the kind treatment of the prisoners. He is happy Mr. Batut's wound is so slight, but is extremely sorry for the loss of poor Fordyce." The unfortunate Capt. Fordyce was a Captain of grenadiers in the 14th regiment, and most of the soldiers were grenadiers of that regiment. As the Captain was a gallant and brave officer, I promised to inter him with all the military honours due to his great merit, which I hope will meet with the approbation of the Honourable Convention. About 250 Carolina men are arrived, under the command of Col. Vail, with 6 pieces of cannon, and a quantity of powder."

Great Bridge, December 12.

"L. Col. Stephen arrived at Kemp's landing last night, and agreeable to my orders sent a party to secure every person in that neighbourhood, that had left Norfolk since the battle of the Great Bridge. He informs he has Mr. Max. Calvert, Doctor Campbell, Mr. Mathew Phipps, and others, now with him, whose examination I now enclose. I have had a number of people from thence to-day, whose stories disagree. They bring two petitions, one from the poor inhabitants of Norfolk, the other from the distressed Highlanders, which I likewise send enclosed; and, having given no answers to them yet, have detained the bearers for farther consideration.---Two gentlemen this moment brought me in a young Scotchman, named Hamilton, who confesses he has bore arms, and was at this fort in Gilman's company; he was making his way to Nansemond. I have ordered him to be coupled to one of his black brother soldiers, with a pair of handcuffs, which is the resolution I have taken shall be the fate of all those cattle, till I am further instructed by your Honourable House. I enclose a copy of my advertisement, dispersed over Princess Anne and Norfolk counties, and hope it will meet with your approbation.---Major Epes arrived here this evening with his party, and Col. Howe with 340 of the Carolina Regulars.---I shall march to-morrow with a number of the troops.---I am just informed that several fail of vessels were arrived to-day, thought to have troops on board, but Col. Howe supposes them to be the tenders returning from North-Carolina."

Two companies of choice riflemen have arrived at head-quarters this week, who are all well armed, commanded by Capt. Campbell of Fincastle, and Capt. Gibson of West Augusta. Capt. Morgan Alexander, with his rifle company, is expected this day; as fine men, we hear, as ever were seen. From undoubted authority, we can assure the public, that effectual measures are fallen upon to supply all the colonies with salt, in a short time, as well

as with another article, which there is the greatest probability will be much used in the Spring.

The 250 Highlanders lately arrived, with their wives and children, who were bound for Cape Fear, but brought into Norfolk by some of the tenders, to recruit Lord Dunmore's army (a most inhuman proceeding, but of a piece with the rest of his conduct) have petitioned Col. Woodford to fall upon some method to have them sent to the place of their destination.---The inhabitants of Norfolk have likewise sued for protection.

A flag of truce came into Col. Woodford a few days ago, from Lord Dunmore, proposing an exchange of Prisoners, which was brought by Lieut. Wallace of the 14th regiment, and a certain Mr. Blair, late of Smithfield, merchant. Col. Woodford returned for answer, that he should consult the Honourable Convention, and acquaint him with their determination.

The Gentlemen who are now prisoners with Lord Dunmore are, Col. Hutchings, Col. Lawson, Capt. Hunter, Mr. Thoroughgood, and 12 private men.---He has sent to Boston Mr. Robinson, one of the Delegates for Princess Anne, with Capt. Matthews and Capt. Deane.---Capt. William Goodrich, whom he lately took prisoner in Nansemond, is sent out, it is said, in one of the tenders.

It is said that Lord Dunmore intends shortly for the West-Indies, with his cargo of slaves, to make the most of them before his departure for England; as by letters lately received, it is affirmed that he would be speedily recalled; his conduct in Virginia being much censured by the Ministry.

On Tuesday last, a large schooner from the West-Indies bound for Norfolk, was taken and brought into Hampton by our men stationed there. She was laden with rum and sugar, and had 2700 dollars on board.

Last Friday se'nnight the sloop Christian, belonging to Mr. Archibald Govan, loaded with wheat, and bound for Glasgow, having met with a gale of wind, put back into Hampton road, and was carried into Hampton, by a party of the minute-men stationed there. On examining the letters aboard of her, many were found to contain sentiments inimical to America, written by people from Norfolk; but, in justice to the owner, we cannot help mentioning, that his letters contained sentiments very friendly to this country. This is the third time this vessel has put back, from accidents.

Last night Col. Bullitt arrived from the army, with Dr. Campbell, of Norfolk, who, besides several other gentlemen of that borough, had surrendered themselves to Col. Woodford, and sued for protection. Lord Dunmore we hear, swears most furiously that he will bombard Norfolk, should the *shirt-men* come into it. They most certainly will, so that we need not be amazed to hear, soon, of that place's being laid in ashes.

A few days ago six of Lord Dunmore's men deserted from the Otter. They met some of our men, on their way to this city, by whom they were treated with the utmost hospitality; in return, they assisted us, with the highest pleasure, in flowing away our baggage, and in expediting our troops to their destined place. When they were asked what induced them to leave Dunmore, they answered, "Hungry bellies naked backs, and no fuel, besides, in other respects, the most cruel and inhuman treatment."

The defeat of the British regulars at the Great Bridge, last Saturday, struck the enemy into such dreadful consternation and terror, that after abandoning their fort, they thought it most prudent to retire from Norfolk, and take refuge on board the ships. It is imagined our troops will take possession of that place without opposition, and hoped that they will soon be able to drive the pirates from the harbour.---It is reported, that Lord Dunmore has requested an exchange of prisoners, and that the King's soldiers killed and wounded in the battle amounted to 202, eleven only of the grenadiers having escaped.

NEW-YORK, January 1.

We are credibly Informed, that the People of the Massachusetts Bay, have completed 15,000 Suits of Soldiers Clothes entirely of their own Wool, Flax, and Manufactory, since the Battle of Lexington.

By Captain Lippitt, who arrived at Providence, (Rhode-Island) from the West-Indies, we are informed, that on the 17th of October, a violent Gale of Wind happened at St. Eustatia, in which 63 fail of Vessels were obliged to put to Sea, but they all had the good Fortune to return in five Days. At St. Kitts 12 fail were lost, not being able to put out. Captain Lippitt was informed at St. Eustatia, that an English Vessel, loading with Salt, at Salteruda, had been seized by a Spanish armed Vessel. He touched at Turk's-Island about the tenth of November, and was told by the Governor of that Island, that a Ship of War from Jamaica, was daily expected there, to prevent Vessels from the Northern Colonies taking in Salt.

Wednesday Evening came to Town, two of the Gentlemen mentioned under the Cambridge Head, who relate the following further Particulars, viz.---That the Ministerial Army was supposed in the Whole, to consist of about 6000 effective Men; that they were greatly distressed, especially since the Store Ship was taken by Capt. Manly, which had much dispirited them; that Fuel and Provisions of all Sorts were exceeding scarce, the Army being at an Allowance of 4lb. of Pork, and two Loaves of Bread per Week each Man, that 30 Men from each Company were ordered with Saws and Axes to cut up the Wharfs, Old Meeting House, &c. for Fuel, that there were 500 many fresh Provisions to be had; that when there were, it sold in Sterling Money, at the following Prices, viz. Beef per lb. 1s. 6d. to 2s. A Sheep 5l. Two Geese 20s. and other Things in Proportion. Salt Butter 2s. 6d. Rum by Retail 12s. &c.---That our Battery at Leechmore's Point is within about Half a Mile of Boston, and will, when finished, command a very considerable Part of the Town.

Last Saturday Morning a Gentleman had his Pocket picked of his Pocket Book in the Fly Market, containing Cash to the Amount of about 60l.

To-morrow, the Ship Sampson, Captain Coupar, sails for London, with a great Number of Passengers.

A Gentleman arrived here last Saturday Night from New-London, by Water, which Place he left the Thursday before, where he saw the Post from Rhode-Island, who informed him, General Lee was arrived at that Place from Boston, with an Escort of about 30 Men, in order to defend that Island against any Attempts made thereon by the Troops that lately sailed from Boston.

On Friday the 22d Ultimo, at Nine o'Clock in the Evening, departed this Life, HELENA, the Wife of Thomas Moncrieffe, Esq; of whom it may be said with the greatest Justice, that SHE WAS A TRULY AMABLE WOMAN.

Nature had fitted her for Happiness, by blending sprightly good Humour, with the sweetest Affability. Her Countenance was always pleasing, because it was always serene; for her Bosom was the calm Abode of every gentle Emotion. A Stranger to the more boisterous Passions, which vex and disturb the human Soul, she passed through this short Period of Existence, without one Foe; and died in the Time of Life lamented by all who knew her. Having fulfilled

every Duty as a Child, a Wife and a Mother, it hath pleased the Almighty to approve of her Conduct, by snatching her from the Vanities of this frail Life, and crowning her with immortal Bliss.

On the 28th ult. Miss Long, an amiable young Lady, and Daughter to an aged and respectable Citizen, of this Place, whether sleeping in her Chair, having fainted, or being in a Fit, is uncertain (for her Brother, who just before waited on two Ladies home from his House, had not left her above half an Hour) had her Cloaths set on fire by a Spark from the Hearth, which, before she awaked, spread to such a Height, that all her Efforts to extinguish it were in vain. In this Situation she had Fortitude and Presence of Mind, to endeavour to get out at the Street Door; but here a strong Lock resisted her greatest Efforts, altho' she was so long in the Attempt, that the Paint on the Door and Wainscot was raised into Blisters, and the Surface of the Floor under her Feet was burnt to a Coal: Her next Attempt was at the Yard Door, which, after pulling back two large Bolts, and removing an Iron Bar, she opened, and was seen from an opposite Window by two young Ladies, who had been awaked by her Cries, coming out a Pyramid of Flame! She immediately threw herself on the Snow, but notwithstanding this favourable Circumstance, the Fire was not extinguished until a Neighbour, who had been called up on Purpole, arrived to her Assistance. Her Cloaths were literally burnt to Ashes, so that hardly a Cinder remained; the Paint on the Back Door, like that on the Front, was raised into Blisters, and several large Spots on the Floor in the Entry were burnt to a Coal. From the Snow she was wrapped up in a Sheet and carried to her Bed, until proper Assistance could be called to her Relief; but here we must quit Narration, for to paint in adequate Colours her dreadful Situation, (as it appeared upon Examination) baffles all Description.---Imagination recoils with Horror from the Scene.---To be tied to a Stake and burnt to Death must bear nothing to what she endured; for there the Flames soon become their own Cure, and as they burn, destroy and relieve; but in this Case they had only attacked the Surface of the Body, and exciting the Powers of Feeling to the utmost, left every individual Point at once the Subject of the keenest Torture and the most exquisite Sensibility; yet, under all this Load of Misery, she preserved a calm Mind---afflicted, as far as her rigid Muscles would allow, her Friends and Physicians in their Efforts for her Relief---spoke with Firmness and Composure---and with a most affectionate Attention, requested that her aged Parents might not be Spectators of her Distress; so that Pity and Commiseration for her Sufferings, even in the Breat of her nearest Friend, were frequently made to give way to Wonder and Astonishment at the Patience and Fortitude with which she endured them.---God however in his Mercy suffered not her Agonies to be of very long Duration, but after having exhibited her for a few Hours an Example of the firmest Fortitude, and the most pious Resignation,

TOOK HER TO HIS REST.

To these Virtues, for which she was so eminently distinguished in her last Moments, be added, during her Life, Innocence of Manners, and Cheerfulness, its constant Companion---an affectionate Regard to her Friends---the most dutiful and tender Attachment to her Parents, and a constant Attention upon all the Duties of Religion.
