PROCLAMATION.

THE scarcity of Forage last spring, and consequent demands of the army, having filled the Farmer with apprehensions, and rendered it uncertain what proportion he can depend on for his own use the ensuing winter:—

I HAVE THOUGHT FIT to issue this Proclamation, to encourage him to cut and cure the greatest quantity of GRASS the season will admit; and to avoid the inconveniences attending foraging by small detachments through the country, and give this public assurance, that all persons delivering two thirds of their fresh HAY for the King's magazines, shall keep the remaining third secure from all further claims. That the collecting may be conducted with strict justice, Commissioners will attend in the several districts, assisted by the civil and military officers of the county, under their inspection, the whole will be weighed and certificates granted as well for the HAY as the Cartage. By this mode it is expected perfect satisfaction will be given the upright, and the artful detected in their attempts to conceal or defraud.

A PROCLAMATION.

THE Necessity of a seasonable and ample Supply of FUEL, for the use of his Majesty's Troops, obliges me, however reluctant to call on the Inhabitants of Long-Island, to furnish a Proportion of Wood for the Barrack Yard in New-York, several plans have been successively adopted; but without their Assistance a sufficient Quantity to guard against the Severities of a long Winter cannot be procured; and I flatter myself, they will the more cheerfully comply with the Requisition, as the Burthen, if any, will be equally borne, and the Injury that must unavoidably befall Individuals, from an unforeseen Deficiency be prevented.

The County of King's is therefore required to get 1500 Cords; Queen's County 4500; and the western Part of Suffolk (including Huntington, Islip, Smith Town, and Brookhaven) 3000 Cords, ready cut and corded by the 15th of August ensuing.

And that the Distribution may be equally made and all Waste avoided, the Civil and Military Officers of each County will meet, on Saturday the 25th Instant, at Flat Bush, Jamaica, and Smith-Town, and assess on each District, a proportionate Part of the Quantity demanded. The Officers in the District will then direct the Farmers each to cut his Part, regulating it by the Wood Land he possesses; and on Notice being given, will muster the Teams of the Neighbourhood, and cart the Wood to such Landing as shall be appointed; where the Wood ready corded, is to be by them surveyed in the Presence of the Barrack Officer, who will give a Certificate on the Spot for the Number of Cords, to the Proprietor at the Rate of Thirty Shillings per Cord for Walnut, and Twenty for Oak; and also for the Cartage, at the Rate of Four Shillings a Cord per Mile. The Teams so employed will be fully protected, and the Certificates punctually paid.

The foregoing Regulations not being adapted to the Situation of the eastern Part of Suffolk; the Inhabitants of Southold, Southampton, and East-Hampton, are required to cut in the Wood-lands late belonging to William Smith, and William Floyd of said County (now out in Rebellion) in the parts thereof nearest to the Landing by Mallick Neck, 3000 Cords of Wood, to be ready by the first of September. On due Information being given, they will cart the same, and attend in the mean while to its Preservation, and when surveyed at the water side, they will receive at the Rate of Ten Shillings per Cord, for cutting and carting as above mentioned.

These Orders being calculated at once to provide for the Army, and to give every Security

to the Farmer against others interfering with his Property; he will be left without Excuse, if by a criminal Neglect he does not avail himself of the advantageous Offers held out to him, and must expect to suffer all the Evils consequent on his Disobedience.

The humble ADDRESS of the Inhabitants of QUEEN'S COUNTY.

May it please your EXCELLENCY,
DESIROUS, as we ever have been, of expressing our grateful Sense of the Royal Attention, and of testifying our steady Attachment to the British Constitution; if we have not embraced the earliest opportunity to congratulate your Excellency on your Appointment to the Government, an expectation of doing it in the usual Way on the Revival of civil Power, and of declaring our Sentiments in the most authentic Form, has occasioned our Delay. But the peculiar State of the War, and critical Arrangements of the Campaign, rendering it expedient to postpone this grateful Blessing a little longer, we would no longer refrain our Inclinations to assure your Excellency, of the sincere Pleasure we feel, on your being appointed the Representative of our Sovereign in this Province, and the pleasing Prospect we entertain of being happy under your Administration.

After experiencing for many Years the Benefits flowing from the active Zeal and upright Conduct of his Excellency Governor TRYON, you will easily believe we could not, without Regret, hear of his leaving the Government, and that we felt an Anxiety respecting his Successor. The long Residence of your Excellency among us, and the repeated Instances of your Attachment to the Colony, have dispelled our Fears. Your Excellency will then permit us to declare, that the Principles which inspired a large Majority of the People of Queen's County, to oppose the beginning and Progress of those dangerous Measures that have led this County to the most fatal Convulsions, do still animate us to promote his Majesty's Service by our utmost Exertions, and to a cheerful Acquiescence in whatever is necessary to accelerate that happy Day, when Relations, Friends and Fellow Citizens, shall re-embrace each other, and return to the Offices, the Pleasures and Employments of Peace; when we shall enjoy our ancient Privileges, participate in an extensive Commerce, be exempted from all Taxation not imposed by ourselves, and included in one comprehensive System of Felicity with the Parent Country.

GENTLEMEN,
I HEARTILY thank you for this Address:—It is not the less pleasing to me because of the time I have been a considerable Time in the Government; one not fond of Compliments, and proud of being useful, may derive Satisfaction from this very Consideration.

Sir Henry Clinton desires that the good Inhabitants of this Province should enjoy all the Blessings of civil Government, unmixed with the Inconveniences that just in this instant, under our present Circumstances might flow from its formal Revival, has appointed me as Lieutenant-General to watch over the Interests, and adopt every Measure that can promote or ensure the Happiness of the People. Magistrates who have deservedly your Confidence are appointed to hear or decide differences that may arise. The neighbourhood of the King's Army has brought you Wealthy, and given Value to whatever you possess. The Troops will render you perfectly secure, they will respect your Rights; and far from offering will defend you from Injury and Insult.—This Security will call forth your Industry, and a superior Culture of your Fields, with Advantage to yourselves, will afford a plentiful Supply to the Army. May your Situation become not only pleasing to yourselves, but inviting to your Neighbours; may your Happiness prove a Motive to all the unfortunate Provinces, to change the Anarchy and Tyranny they are brought under, for the blessings of his Majesty's Government.

Queen's County from the Beginning has given Proofs of its Loyalty; the Instances which on late Occasions it has given of Zeal and Spirit, are viewed by your Friends with Applause, and will teach your Enemies Respect.

We are informed that his Majesty's fleet under the command of Vice Admiral Arbuthnot, is in Gardner's Island Sound, adjoining to Long-Island, between Montack Point and Plum Island, one of the best harbours in North-America, admitting of the first rate men of war, where the Squadron may safely ride, land locked, summer and winter, in the heaviest gales:—At the same time the navigation of the Sound is perfectly commanded; New-London, the principal port of Connecticut, distant only about 18 miles, and Rhode-Island about 40; no egress or regress can be had to and from the latter port, without the immediate assistance of the British Admiral, whose fleet, can, at any time put to sea at a moment's notice from his Frigate's signal.

On Saturday last died, at New-Town, on Long-Island, Mrs. ELIZABETH COLVILL, in the 60th year of her age. To an uniform christian she added the most indulgent parent, the generous mistress, and the sincere friend: Admired for her approaching dissolution, she received the summons of her blessed Creator with a serenity of mind peculiar only to the virtuous; and as she lived beloved, so she died universally regretted by all who knew her.
